Physical Description

This building is of stone and brick construction, with thick render painted white. Several internal doors have been filled in at some stage, and a new door formed into the garage. The floors were stone. The roof was of micro orb corrugated iron. The external windows were fortified with iron bars. At a later stage a lean to was added of plasterboard.

The building was later converted to a garage, and a large open building was constructed abutting the older building. New doorways were created through the stone walls. The garage was a timber framed structure, with corrugated iron walls and curved roof.

The building has been abandoned, and despite efforts to secure it, it is open and has been subject to use and damage from animals, and people with vandalism and graffiti.

History

The stone building originally formed part of the nearby law and order precinct. Its primary role was probably as a cook house, given the large kitchen. It likely functioned as a support building, kitchen and storeroom.

In the 1960s the building was converted into use as a garage. This involved the construction of a large timber framed, corrugated iron clad building abutting the older stone building. The alterations were carried out by the owner, Mervyn Stare. After a long use as a garage, the site is now abandoned.

Archaeology

There is potential for archaeological evidence revealing the architectural history of the site, and its various uses over time.

Statement of Significance:	

This site is significant as an overlooked part of the law and order precinct at Roebourne. The use of the site as a garage is a reminder of a period when local mechanical expertise would have been an essential part of local life, and provided an essential service to locals and travellers alike. The two phases of architecture are both important examples of the shift from stone-built to metal clad buildings in the town of Roebourne.
