Physical Description	•

Miller's Well is a former stock watering well located on land that was part of Karratha Station. It is situated close to Miller's Well oval in Karratha (now the Kevin Richards Memorial Oval) and to the west of Peg's Well. The well is constructed from concrete pieces held together with iron bolts and wire on a concrete base. There is evidence of metal sheets which once encased the exterior walls of the well.

History

There was good availability of sub-artesian water and an average aquifier depth of approximately 9m on the land comprising Karratha station. This, along with the natural pools, provided good watering facilities for stock.¹

Mr William Allen (Bill) Leslie, owner of Karratha Station from 1929-1966, sank 20 extra wells on the station and built troughs connected to each well in all the adjoining paddocks (eg Peg's Well). Wells were used as watering points for stock. Miller's Well is believed to have been built by and named after Frank Miller, a well sinker who spent a lot of time in the area "well sinking". His name can be seen on many wells and tanks in the area.

The well now lies within the Karratha townsite, a little to the west of Peg's Well. The name of the well has been given to the suburb located in this vicinity.

Prior to the development of Karratha Townsite in this area, a moderately dense spread of artefacts was recorded approximately 300 m south of the well. This was thought to number approximately 200 plus artefacts, primarily of fine grained silicified sandstone. Solomon James demonstrated knapping in this location. ²

Archaeology

There is little potential for archaeological evidence of the use of the well as a part of Karratha Station.

Miller's Well, together with Peg's Well, are all that remain in the town of the pastoral activities on Karratha Station. It provides an important visual connection with the origins of the town as a pastoral sheep station.
