I'd like to begin by sincerely thanking the City of Karratha for the honour of being named Karratha Citizen of the Year. Being involved in the selection panel for 2026 showed me just how many people are working quietly in our community, with the vision to make a difference, and that makes this award especially meaningful to me.

Being part of that process reinforced why nominating matters. Many people give their time and energy without recognition, and nomination simply acknowledges that effort and reminds them that what they do truly matters.

Being a good citizen is important because strong communities don't happen by chance. They are built by people who choose to show up, support others, and contribute in ways both big and small.

This year has been significant for Karratha Shotokan Karate. We opened a third dojo in Dampier alongside Wickham and Karratha, grew our membership from around 50 students to over 100, and hosted our first combined club championships focused on effort, respect, resilience, and connection.


Karate offers more than physical training. It builds confidence, discipline, and emotional control, encourages inclusion, and supports people of all abilities in an environment where everyone belongs.

# **Young Community Citizen of the Year Nominees**

## **Ella Dale**

Ella Dale has demonstrated outstanding leadership and innovation in both school and community. As Head Girl of St Luke's College, she leads the Student Council, mentors younger students, and excels in public speaking. Beyond school, she founded Greener Karratha, planting over 200 native trees across eight communities and establishing a school nursery. Selected for the 2024 Female Future Leadership Program, Ella has inspired environmental stewardship, strengthened civic pride, and created lasting impact through sustainability, student mentorship, and community engagement in the Pilbara.

## **Alexander Scott**

Alex has turned personal loss into powerful community impact by running 21 km daily for 21 days, raising nearly \$6,000 for Beyond Blue. Through this 441 km challenge, he sparked vital conversations about mental health and suicide, openly sharing his own experiences with depression. His leadership and courage reduced stigma, inspired others to seek help, and engaged the Pilbara community in mental health advocacy, creating a lasting legacy of awareness, compassion, and connection.

## **Luke Kofalvi**

Since joining the fire brigade as a teenager, Luke has demonstrated extraordinary commitment to community safety. Volunteering with both his primary brigade and the Nickol Bay Bush Fire Brigade, he responds to emergencies, mentors Youth Emergency Services cadets, and educates the public on fire preparedness. At just 21, he became Apparatus Officer, ensuring equipment readiness and operational efficiency. Luke's courage, leadership, and dedication have strengthened emergency response capabilities and inspired the next generation of community-focused volunteers.

# Senior Community Citizen of the Year Nominee

## **Elizabeth Smith**

Beth Smith has dedicated her life to strengthening the Roebourne community. Co-founding the Mingullatharndo dry community in 1990, she created a safe, culturally supportive space for people seeking change. Beth also established a community garden nursery, nurtures children through church programs, and runs the annual Elders' Birthday Celebration. Through decades of volunteering, mentoring, and leadership, she has fostered connection, cultural pride, and healthier living, leaving a lasting impact on Elders, families, and the wider community.

## **The Innovators' Tea Party**

Since 2016, The Innovators' Tea Party (TITP) has empowered regional students in Karratha and across WA by providing STEM career exposure, mentorship, and hands-on experiences. Through initiatives like Speed Networking events, students connect with professionals, explore career pathways, and gain internships or leadership opportunities. TITP challenges gender stereotypes, inspires confidence, and equips students to pursue STEM careers regardless of location. Partnering with schools, businesses, and mentors, the program fosters long-term social impact, transforming students into future STEM leaders who often return as mentors themselves.

## **Karratha Scout Group / Fiona Woolley "Emu" - Karratha Scout Group.**

Fiona has put in many, many hours of volunteer work to put together a program for our local youth, Scouts aged 11-14. She organises, facilitates and leads the program including all of the behind the scene administration so that members receive their badges and can obtain peak awards. Her efforts have seen an increase of numbers in the Scout section as well as an increase in parent volunteers. Her contribution to the Youth within the Karratha Community is greatly appreciated.

## **Karratha Volunteer Fire & Rescue Service**

The Karratha Volunteer Fire & Rescue Service is a wholly volunteer-run brigade dedicated to emergency response and community wellbeing. In 2025, they raised over \$12,500 for local and national charities through fundraisers, open days, and awareness campaigns. Their Santa Lolly Run delights hundreds of families, and school visits educate future volunteers. By combining rigorous training with year-round community engagement, fire safety education, and charitable initiatives, the brigade demonstrates courage, compassion, and lasting commitment to Karratha and the wider Pilbara region.



## **The Happy Hub**

The Happy Hub is a welcoming community space designed for children and teens of all abilities to come together, connect, and grow. Its vision is to create an inclusive environment where families feel supported and young people can build friendships through shared interests. At its heart, The Happy Hub fosters natural circles of support by encouraging informal peer mentoring and offering safe, social settings for children to interact and learn from one another. It is more than just a meeting place—it's a hub of connection, learning, and belonging for the whole community.

## **Val and Kathy's Crafty Kitchen**

Val and Kathy's Crafty Kitchen is a hub of connection, healing, and empowerment in leramugadu/Roebourne. They provide a culturally safe space that combats isolation, fosters companionship, and celebrates community through shared meals, creative activities, and intergenerational projects. Beyond weekly sessions, they promote wellbeing, skill-building, resilience, and healthy lifestyles. Their grassroots leadership extends to supporting the community during COVID and other crises by safely distributing food, blankets, and essentials, demonstrating dedication, care, and lasting positive impact.

## **Dust and Adversity**

Dust and Adversity is a grassroots mental health movement in Karratha, founded to Shatter the Silence. Built on resilience, compassion, and courage, it channels 100% of profits into education programs in local schools and sporting clubs, empowering young people and fostering open conversations about wellbeing. Through community engagement, bold messaging, and a deep understanding of local challenges, Dust and Adversity breaks stigma, strengthens connections, and transforms lives—making the Pilbara a stronger, healthier, and more resilient community.

## **Cheer 6714 Community Easter Hunt**

The event had a turnout of over 300 community members attending from all ages and cultural/economic backgrounds. Participants hunted for paper eggs that were traded for real easter eggs. All participants were involved in the activities, older participants sharing and assisting younger participants regardless of whether they knew each other. Families were able to enjoy the local park, many sitting down to picnic while the children all laughed and played.

## **Karratha Basketball Association**

The Karratha Basketball Association (KBA) engages over 3,000 participants weekly, offering competitions, youth employment, and referee and coach development. Through mobile 3x3 courts, regional outreach, mental health workshops, and inclusive programs like Harmony Round, KBA strengthens community connection, wellbeing, and opportunity. Supported by passionate volunteers and committees, KBA makes basketball accessible, develops life skills, and fosters resilience. Its leadership, innovation, and commitment to the Pilbara community make KBA a deserving nominee for Community Group of the Year.

## **Pilbara Trailblazers**

Pilbara Trailblazers is a volunteer-led running club bringing the Pilbara community together through inclusive events and programs. From weekly parkruns to the Red Dirt Backyard Ultra, the club fosters connection, resilience, and wellbeing while supporting youth participation, mental health initiatives, and adventure tourism. With over 200 members, 40 volunteers, and strong local partnerships, Pilbara Trailblazers creates accessible, family-friendly opportunities for outdoor activity and leaves a lasting positive impact on Karratha and the wider region.

## **Karratha Women's Place**

Karratha Women's Place (KWP) provides a safe, welcoming space empowering women of all ages and backgrounds. Since 2019, KWP has reduced social isolation, improved mental health, and delivered programs such as the "My Story of Being a Mum" book, the Healing from the Heart therapeutic program, and the annual Women's Health Expo. Through support, education, and community connection, KWP transforms lives, helping women thrive, build networks, and feel valued in Karratha and the wider Pilbara region.

## **Atanas Dimitrov**



As the Deputy Principal at Roebourne District High School and a driving force behind the Magpies Basketball Club, Atanas dedicates countless hours of his own time to ensuring local children are engaged, supported, and given every opportunity to thrive.

## **Katie Marinko**

Katie has led major community health initiatives, including free skin checks, men's health nights, and menopause education. As Vice-Chair of St John Wickham/Roebourne, she secured a new 4WD ambulance, expanded defibrillator access, and mentors new volunteers. Dedicated to improving local emergency care, Katie donates countless hours supporting health, safety, and community wellbeing.

## **Michael Whittaker**

Michael is a dedicated community leader whose volunteer work spans emergency services, youth development, and local governance. As Training Coordinator for Marine Rescue Port Walcott, he founded the Cadets program and organises community events in Point Samson. He supports youth sport, serves on multiple community boards, and provides humanitarian aid in Bali. With over 18 years in the Fire Service, Michael's leadership, compassion, and commitment have strengthened community safety, connection, and wellbeing across the Pilbara region.

## **Karen Huang**

Karen Huang is a dynamic community leader who connects global insight with local action. As Founder of the Northwest Multicultural Association WA, she created the region's first platform for cultural inclusion and diversity. Through her consultancy with Asia Pacific Explorer Studio, she promotes cross-cultural engagement across Asia-Pacific, bringing global best practices to Western Australia. A North Regional TAFE board member and award-winning volunteer, Karen continues to champion inclusion, education, and community empowerment across regional and multicultural sectors.

## **Carol Hegan**

Carol Hegan is a passionate advocate for people with disability, leading initiatives that promote inclusion and support across the Pilbara. As Chair of the Pilbara Disability Network and founder of The Inclusive Movement, she organises NDIS access days and the International Day of People with Disability. Carol volunteers her time running the All Abilities football and netball programs and the MyTime support group, championing opportunities, awareness, and inclusion for people with disability and their families.

## **Jo-Anne Lee Turner**

Jo-Anne Turner has made a lasting impact in Karratha through her compassionate leadership and community service. She leads and expands the Red Kite initiative, supporting local families and inspiring volunteers. Jo-Anne organises inclusive Christmas lunches, assists seniors through the Autumn Club, and supports vulnerable individuals rebuilding their lives. Her dedication fosters collaboration, inclusion, and resilience, making her a driving force in strengthening community connection and wellbeing across Karratha.

## **Jason Bravington**

Jason is tackling Karratha's mental health challenges through his initiative Dust and Adversity, which encourages people to "shatter the silence" around mental health. He raises funds through merchandise sales to deliver awareness courses for local sporting groups, schools, and clubs. Jason's work breaks down stigma, promotes open conversation, and empowers the community to support one another through mental health struggles.

## **Cody Panettiere**

Cody, owner of Fusion Kitchen Dampier, is dedicated to supporting local youth by employing 15-20 junior staff and offering apprenticeships in hospitality. He personally funds their hospitality and kitchen training courses, ensuring valuable skills for their future. As a mentor and role model, Cody treats his team like family, sponsors community events, and hosts kids' raffles, making a lasting impact through youth development and community generosity.

## **Dereka (Dee) Van Beek**

Dereka (Dee) Van Beek has over 20 years' experience in community services and is the Founder and driving force behind the Karratha Women's Place, creating vital programs to support women's social connection, wellbeing, and empowerment. Dee personally dedicated thousands of volunteer hours, funded programs, and developed initiatives including therapeutic support, community expos, and the "My Story of Being a Mum" book. Through her vision, resilience, and leadership, Dee has transformed women's services in Karratha, fostering inclusion, support, and opportunity across the region.

## **David Heathwood**

David Heathwood has dedicated over 20 years to youth and community services across regional and remote Western Australia. As co-founder and former CEO of Blue Beanie Projects, and now Manager of Community Impact at RRKAC, he has delivered trauma-informed programs, mentoring, and advocacy for young people and families. Known for hands-on service, humility, and empowering leadership, David also volunteers extensively, coaches youth sports, and mobilises community support, strengthening social connection, mental health, and opportunities for growth across the Pilbara.
