K-Pop

K-Pop brought together the local community of Millars Well to activate the pedestrian bridge to Kats oval and collaborated on a vibrant community art project that will forever bring a pop of colour to the neighbourhood. The vibrant, inclusive artwork also included contributions from Wangaba Roebourne Art Group. Self organised, K-Pop sought out its own funding through RAC grants with the simple objective of brightening regional shared spaces to make people smile and enhance livability. The group demonstrated inclusivity, creativity, collaboration and determination to bring their vision to life. The leaders of this organisation represent an incredibly talented cross section of Karratha's community. With representation from council members, private and public sector employees, NGO employees, mums, dads, creatives - the group brought together an incredibly passionate group of locals to ripple out local pride through vibrant community artwork. They modeled that placemaking doesn't need to be the responsibility of local government alone. They modeled what active citizenship and local pride can look like in what has historically been a transient town.

Nikki Hemmett

Nikki Hemmett has been involved in multiple volunteer organisations over her time in Karratha. Most notably, Tambrey Primary School P&C, Dampier Sharks Junior Football Club, Karratha Karts Club, Karratha BMX Club, Karratha Basketball Association, Karratha Water Polo and various others. Nikki has been a strong part of the committee for all of the above clubs normally in a President, Treasurer, Secretary or Team Manager capability. Her ongoing contributions have seen these clubs and organisations flourish from Nikki's input and commitment. Nikki is proactive in organising busy bees, umpiring, coaching, marshalling, judging, etc... Her lists of skills and talent she shares combined with the time and effort is unparallelled. By doing and not telling, Nikki Hemmett has set the example of what a club person should be. She never asks or demands, she only ever volunteers and brings others along with her to improve the town she lives in.

Northwest Multicultural Association WA Inc.

The Northwest Multicultural Association WA Inc. plays a pivotal role in promoting cultural diversity and inclusivity in the City of Karratha. Through various cultural events, celebrations, and advocacy efforts, the association fosters cross-cultural understanding and advocates for equal rights. Their educational programs combat racism and promote social inclusion. The focus on inclusivity, diversity celebrations, and support for newcomers ensures a sense of belonging. The association's leadership inspires a harmonious community, and their capacity-building initiatives empower individuals, fostering a supportive culture. The positive impact on Karratha is evident through a more inclusive and accepting community, making them a role model for effective multiculturalism and social inclusion.

Dampier Community Association

Association (DCA), established in 1968 and operating as a not-for-profit since 1977, is committed to representing and promoting the civic and social advancement of Dampier. With a focus on community, care, connection, communication, citizenship, advocacy, and support, the DCA serves as a vital resource for the town. Over its 50-year history, the association, run by a dedicated volunteer board and 14 committee members, has amassed an estimated 50,000 volunteer hours, leading to significant growth, including the employment of three staff members. The DCA encourages community engagement through numerous Dampier-based events, including the renowned Dampier Art Awards, and manages the Dampier Caravan Park and Community Hub. Beyond facility management and major events, the DCA provides various services and opportunities, emphasizing inclusivity and community well-being. Notably, the association has established a Dampier Community Garden with a focus on sustainability, facilitates art workshops and classes, supports seniors and youths through diverse programs, and engages volunteers through recognition events. Financially stable and with a positive reputation, the DCA's responsible management ensures a lasting positive impact on the community, contributing significantly to the betterment of Dampier's residents.

Pilbara Trailblazers

Founded in 2021, Pilbara Trailblazers aims to unite individuals for grassroots running events in the Pilbara region. The club hosts two major events annually, a 12-week trail running program, and manages weekly Parkruns. By offering local outdoor activities, the club introduces new runners to trail running, enhances current runners' skills, and creates volunteering opportunities. Pilbara Trailblazers inspires people to adopt active and healthy lifestyles, supports goal setting, and

provides opportunities to explore local trails. Recognizing the importance of active recreation for physical and mental well-being, the club fosters an inclusive community that offers group support, encourages participation, and celebrates achievements while aiding individuals in overcoming challenges.

Karratha Volunteer Fire and Rescue Service

The Karratha Volunteer Fire and Rescue Service (VFRS), established in 1973, has been an unwavering pillar of safety for the Pilbara region for half a century. With a dedicated crew of 14 active firefighters responding to over 200 incidents in 2023 alone, the volunteers have shown exceptional commitment, responding to emergencies, including 110 bushfires and 43 road crash rescues in the past two years, totaling 1465 hours. Beyond their operational duties, the brigade actively engages with the community through youth cadet programs, school visits, fundraisers, and events like the iconic Christmas lolly run, a 25-year tradition that brings joy to over 10,000 people in Karratha. Despite their small crew, the volunteers undergo weekly training to maintain and enhance their skills for various emergencies, showcasing their dedication to community safety. The brigade's involvement in community events, school programs, and initiatives like McHappy Day fundraising contributes significantly to community well-being. The Karratha VFRS not only responds to incidents but also invests over 1500 volunteer hours annually, demonstrating compassion, commitment, and a desire to inspire the next generation of emergency service personnel.

Nor West Jockey Club

The Nor West Jockey Club plays a vital role in supporting the local economy and community. Through large community events, it creates jobs, attracts visitors, generates revenue, and promotes local businesses. The club actively enriches the community by addressing important issues such as alcohol, drugs, smoking, mental health, and safe transport. Additionally, the Nor West Jockey Club is committed to providing work opportunities and valuable work experience for local disadvantaged individuals, aiming to open doors to future prospects for them. The club's focus extends beyond racing events, striving to create a better environment for patrons, volunteers, supporters, and officials while fostering a sense of community engagement and well-being.

Her work in the Healing Hearts = Strong Kids Practitioner program is contributing to the community's capacity-building and understanding of trauma-informed care for children in the West Pilbara. Lauren's dedication and networking efforts with local organisations further enhance her impact and role as a positive influence in the community.

Shane Harris

Shane is a dedicated community sports volunteer, currently serving as the President of the Burrup Flames basketball association and actively participating in the Karratha Netball Association and Karratha Basketball Association. Leah's goal is to help dog owners have obedient, well-socialised pets, enhancing community safety and reducing injuries and associated medical or vet bills. She continually updates her knowledge, providing a unique service that significantly improves the lives of dogs and their owners. Notably, Leah's dedication goes beyond training; she played a heroic role by camping on the roadside to find a missing dog after a car accident.

Adam Duncombe

For over 13 years, Adam has been a key contributor to the Rockbreakers charity group, raising over \$200,000 for locals in need. Beyond fundraising, he donates his time, energy, and resources to assist those requiring support. Adam dedicates significant personal time to coordinate sponsorship for the Rockbreakers charity golf day, engaging with businesses and the community to identify beneficiaries. His efforts inspire numerous companies and individuals to contribute time and resources for repairs and maintenance, making a positive impact on people in desperate situations. Rhian Ambrosius

Since moving to Karratha in 2013, Rhian has been an active volunteer, serving as a Senior Firefighter at Karratha Volunteer Fire and Rescue Services and as an Emergency Management Technician for St John Ambulance Karratha since 2019. With over 800 jobs attended, including during the 2019-2020 Black Summer, Rhian goes beyond her duties, volunteering for community events like Speedway, FeNaCING, Santa lolly runs, Youth Cadets, and school visits. As Lieutenant from 2019-2023, she organised training and collaborated with other emergency services. Rhian volunteered over 1000 hours this year alone with St John Ambulance, mentoring new members and obtaining a Trainer Assessor Qualification. Passionate about training, Rhian is building a cadet program for the volunteer fire brigade, which will be a stepping stone to becoming a volunteer firefighter.

Trevor Patton

Trevor has been an exceptional volunteer at Karratha State Emergency Service Unit since 1985, contributing over 38 years of dedicated service. As the Local Manager for more than 16 years, he plays a vital role in operational and interagency coordination, ensuring readiness and response capability. Trevor, a qualified trainer and assessor, imparts his expertise through coaching, skill development, and training courses for Karratha SES personnel and other units in the Pilbara. His extensive involvement in radio communications, road crash rescue, and storm damage response is crucial. Trevor, also the SES Volunteer Association Vice President North, leads by example, excelling in diverse operational duties and consistently supporting the community in emergency situations. Since October 2006 Trevor has notched up more than 14, 685 hours service at Karratha SES, which equates to \$1,174 800 investment to the state of Western Australia. His commitment, versatility, and longevity of service make him a valuable asset and a shining example to all volunteers in the Pilbara region.
